Description

The Truman Scholarship is a highly competitive, merit-based award offered to U.S. citizens and U.S. nationals from Pacific Islands who wish to go to graduate school in preparation for a career in government, the non-profit sector or elsewhere in public service. Truman Scholars participate in leadership development programs and have special opportunities for internships and employment with the federal government.

Morris K Udall Native American Internships

Eligibility criteria

In order to qualify for this benefit program, you must be Native American/American Indian, you or a family member must be enrolled in a federally recognized American Indian tribe or Alaskan Native village, and you must be accepted or enrolled in an accredited degree program, college or university.

Description

The Udall Foundation established the Native American Congressional Internship Program to give Native American college students an opportunity to learn about the federal government from the inside. For ten weeks, Native American college students work in congressional offices and the White House to gain a firsthand understanding of the federal government. They also take field trips and meet with congressional members, agency heads, and cabinet secretaries. Through an enrichment component of the program, students are provided with the opportunity to network; meet key decision-makers; and attend lectures, special lunches and receptions.

Morris K Udall Ph.D. Fellowship Program

Eligibility criteria

In order to qualify for this benefit program, you must be a U.S. national, citizen or permanent resident accepted or enrolled as a student in an accredited degree program, college or university, who is studying or intends to pursue a master's degree in the humanities, arts or social sciences.

Description

Each year the Foundation awards two Ph.D. dissertation fellowships of \$24,000 to students whose work is in the areas of environmental public policy or environmental conflict resolution. Recipients must be in the final, writing year of their Ph.D. work and must submit a copy of their dissertation to the Udall Foundation at the end of the award year. Dissertation fellowships are open to scholars in the area(s) of environmental public policy and/or environmental conflict resolution. The Foundation requires that the dissertation topic have significant relevance to national environmental public policy and/or environmental conflict resolution.

The Udall Scholarship is a competitive, merit-based award offered to sophomores and juniors enrolled in an accredited college or university. Each year, the Foundation awards 80 undergraduate scholarships of up to \$5,000 to students studying fields related to the environment, and to Native American and Alaska Native students studying fields related to health care or tribal public policy.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants

Perkins Student Loans

Eligibility criteria

To qualify for this loan program, you must:

Demonstrate financial need

Be a regular student enrolled in an eligible program and working toward a degree or certificate

Demonstrate that you will meet one of the following requirements before enrollment:

Have a high school diploma or a General Education Development (GED) Certificate.

Pass an approved ability to benefit test.

Meet other approved state standards.

Complete a high school education in a home school setting approved under state law.

Be a U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen.

Have a valid Social Security Number (unless you're from the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, or the Republic of Palau).

Be registered with the Selective Service if required. (If you're a male-aged 18 through 25, you must be registered. You can register at <http://www.sss.gov>, or you can call 1-847-688-6888. TTY users for the hearing-impaired can call 1-847-688-2567).

Certify that you are not in default on a federal student loan and do not owe money on a federal student grant.

Certify that you will use federal student aid only for educational purposes.

You might not be eligible for federal student aid if you have been convicted of selling or possessing illegal drugs. Call 1-800-4-FED-AID (1-800-433-3243) to see if the drug conviction law applies to you.

Description

The Federal Perkins Loan program is a "campus-based program", meaning it is administered by the financial aid office at each participating school. Perkins Loans are low-interest (5 percent) loans for both undergraduate and graduate students who demonstrate financial need according to our requirements. Your school is your lender, and the loan is made with government funds. You must repay this loan to your school.

Stafford Loans for Students

Eligibility criteria

To qualify for this loan program, you must:

Demonstrate financial need

be a regular student enrolled in an eligible program and working toward a degree or certificate
demonstrate that you will meet one of the following requirements before enrollment:

Have a high school diploma or a General Education Development (GED) certificate, pass a test approved by the U.S. Department of Education, meet other standards your state establishes that the Department approves, or complete a high school education in a home school setting that is treated as such under state law.

Be a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen.

Have a valid Social Security Number (unless you're from the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, or the Republic of Palau)

Be registered with the Selective Service if required. (If you're a male-aged 18 through 25, you must be registered.)

Certify that you are not in default on a federal student loan and do not owe money on a federal student grant.

Description

There are two kinds of Stafford Loans available to undergraduate and graduate students:

Direct Stafford Loans are made through the William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan (Direct Loan) program. Direct Loan funds come directly from the U.S. Department of Education. You repay a Direct Stafford Loan to the U.S. Department of Education.

Federal Stafford Loans are made through the Federal Family Education Loan (FFEL) Program. FFEL funds come from private lenders such as banks, credit unions, or other lenders that participate in the FFEL Program. You repay a FFEL Stafford Loan to the private lender that made you the loan or to its designated servicer.

Whether you receive a Direct or FFEL Loan depends on the program in which your school participates. Stafford Loans have variable interest rates. The loans you receive will be either subsidized or unsubsidized.

A subsidized loan is awarded on the basis of financial need, as determined by the information you submit on your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). You won't be charged any interest while you're enrolled in school at least half-time, during a grace period, or during deferment periods. The Federal government pays (subsidizes) the interest during these periods.

An unsubsidized loan is not awarded on the basis of need. This means you can get an unsubsidized Stafford Loan even if you don't meet our definition of financial need. Even if you do, if you need to borrow more than your subsidized loan limit, you may receive an unsubsidized loan for the additional amount. For unsubsidized loans, you'll be charged interest from the time the loan is disbursed until it's paid in full. If you allow the interest to accrue (accumulate) while you're in school or during other periods of nonpayment, it will be capitalized. This means the interest will be added to the principal amount of your loan, and additional interest will be based on that higher amount.

Description
